

Succeeding in Reading

September marked the introduction of Succeeding in Reading, a new instructional model to support the literacy development of students in grades primary and 1. Provincewide, over 280 teachers in the English boards now wear the hat of Early Literacy Teacher (ELT) or Enseignant(e) de réussite en lecture (ERL) and work closely with grade primary and 1 classroom teachers to assess and instruct students identified to be part of daily, small group literacy support.

Co-developed by educators from boards and





The Province has provided over a million dollars in resources to assist the implementation of Succeeding in Reading. This includes each school's complement of 720 new student books, written to engage the early learner and support small group instruction. In the coming months, grade primary and grade 1 classrooms will receive resource bins as part of Succeeding in Reading. The primary bins are a cache of hands-on, activity-based resources intended to prompt oral language development and story-telling. The grade 1 bins contain four-packs of colourful fiction and non-fiction books as well as single titles of accessible texts to help students reinforce what they've learned. Throughout the school year, with funding support from the department, boards are broadening the expertise of both classroom teachers and ELTs /ERLs through engaging

professional learning sessions, some of which began as early as June 2011. Succeeding in Reading will expand into grade 2 in 2012–2013.

Early Development Instrument

The government document titled *Our Kids Are Worth It, Strategy for Children and Youth* committed the Department of Education to the Early Development Instrument (EDI) and we are now ready to proceed with a provincial implementation. This is a promising time for our youngest learners and their families. The EDI is a questionnaire developed at the Offord Centre for Child Studies at McMaster University in Ontario. It measures developmental trends in populations of children, over time, in five core areas:

- Physical Health & Well-Being (Can the child hold a pencil?)
- Social Competence (Does the child share with others?)
- Emotional Maturity (Is the child able to concentrate?)
- Language and Cognitive Development (Can the child count?)
- Communication Skills & General Knowledge (Can the child tell a story?)

These areas are good predictors of health, education, and social outcomes over the long term. The data collected are used to plan educational programming for schools and early childhood investments for the community. Participating Primary teachers complete an EDI questionnaire for each child in February of the school

questionnaire for each child in February of the school year. The results are presented in a way that does not identify individual children. The EDI is not used as a diagnostic tool. It is available in both French and English.

ParticipACTION's Think Again campaign encourages parents to consider whether their child is getting the recommended activity.

New Physical Activity and Sedentary Behaviour Guidelines for Children and Youth

Canada has new Physical Activity and Sedentary Behaviour Guidelines for Children and Youth. Physical activity benefits children's academic performance, social behaviour, self-esteem, growth and development, and health. The new Guidelines identify the minimum time, intensity and type of physical activity, and the maximum time for sedentary behaviour that will return measurable health benefits (body composition, blood pressure, cardio-respiratory fitness).

A study (2005) in Nova Scotia showed that only 28% of youth in grade 7, and 4% of youth in grade 11, are considered physically active. Results from the 2010 Keeping Pace study (a.k.a. "PACY") will be available in early 2012. National scientific evidence is comparable and shows that physical activity and fitness levels have dropped dramatically over the same period there has been a steady increase of overweight and obesity, and associated diseases and health risks.

Sedentary behaviour carries significant health risks that are independent of those associated with a lack of leisure time physical activity. Improving health requires both increasing moderate to vigorous physical activity and decreasing sedentary behaviour.

For health benefits, children ages 5 to 17 should

• accumulate at least 60 minutes of moderate to vigorous physical activity daily. This should include vigorousintensity activities at least three days per week, and activities that strengthen muscle and bone at least three days per week;

 limit recreational screen time to no more than two hours daily and limit extended sitting and motorized transport.

The Guidelines are *minimal* targets for measurable health benefits. The more daily physical activity and less sedentary behaviour children incorporate into their lives, the greater the health benefits.

Today's After School Special – Inactivity

Canadian children missing the mark on physical activity in the after-school period.

An alarming modern-day trend has emerged— Canadian kids are coming home from school and are parking their bodies.

According to the 2011 Active Healthy Kids Canada Report Card on Physical Activity for Children and Youth, Canadian children are only getting a meagre 14 minutes of moderate- to vigorous-intensity physical activity in the three-hour period between school dismissal and the supper hour.

The Report Card, focused this year on the after-school period, tells us that the pattern of after-school inactivity is overwhelming, with 92% of this time-period being spent by children and youth in sedentary pursuits or light physical activity.

Schools can help up physical activity even after the dismissal bell rings.

Fostering relationships between schools and local recreation providers can help facilitate the engagement of children in after-school physical activity programming, especially when programs are provided on school property. Schools that cultivate a culture of physical activity—supporting extra-curricular initiatives, providing outdoor equipment and safe playground infrastructure—help lower barriers to after-school physical activity.

ParticipACTION offers a free after-school activity guide and physical activity tracker

To help Canadian parents and caregivers get children away from screens and moving more in the after-school period, ParticipACTION has developed a fun, idea-rich, after-school activity guide, and weekly tracker. Kids can keep score of favourite activities, and see how often they accumulate at least 60 minutes of daily physical activity.

School Boards Introduce Active Start

Children with an intellectual disability in grades primary/one are getting a head start on physical fitness and living a healthy lifestyle by taking in part in an initiative called Active Start being offered by Special Olympics Nova Scotia.

Active Start is part of the Long Term Athlete Development Program (LTAD), which falls under Sport Canada's Canadian Sport for Life initiative. With the ultimate aim of promoting



fitness, physical literacy and well-being, the Active Start program provides some of the tools necessary to help students with an ID acquire these important life skills. Resources are also provided to teachers and assistants for successful implementation and achievement of outcomes.

The program was piloted by the Chignecto-Central Regional School Board last spring and has been embraced by seven of the eight boards in Nova Scotia (http://www.ccrsb.ednet.ns.ca/?q=node/612). Equipment distribution, training and support are ongoing throughout the fall and winter with the support of the Department of Education and the Department of Health and Wellness.

An instructional video (produced by Maureen Juma, a student at NSCC) was filmed at Elmsdale District Elementary School and has been requested by all Special Olympics chapters across Canada.

Transportation Trades 11

Thirty students at Annapolis West Education Centre and Hants East Rural High School are enrolled in the newly developed Transportation Trades 11 course. This exciting new course offers students the opportunity to experience the work of a number of automotive trades. Building on the knowledge they obtained while taking Skilled Trades 10, students in Transportation Trades 11 will focus specifically on automotive sector jobs.

Among the course tasks, students will disassemble and reassemble an automobile engine. This gives them the opportunity to relate the theory of internal combustion with the actual components. Students can actually see and feel where ignition takes place and how that drives



the piston. They follow the action of the piston to the crankshaft and understand how a car is made to move.

Students will also perform routine service and maintenance on a car. They will change oil, install brakes, and diagnose trouble. Students will also remove and install parts such as doors and engine covers. All of this work is done in a project-based learning environment, the Skilled Trades Centre.

In line with the JobsHere plan, Transportation Trades 11 is one of the Skilled Trades courses designed to give students an understanding of what work in the trades can mean. The province of Nova Scotia has made a significant investment in this course by providing students with tools, equipment, new 2011 Chevrolet Cruze cars and new engines. In February four more schools will pilot Transportation Trades 11 for their students.



Helping students discover options for the future

Do you know a student who likes to be creative, excels with hands on tasks and enjoys learning new things? If so, then why not encourage your student to try a skilled trade or technology. During the 2011/2012 school year nearly 600 high school students from across Nova Scotia will be invited to participate in Skills Canada – Nova Scotia's (SCNS) youth projects.

These one-day career exploration events give students the opportunity to discover various career options in the trade and technology industries. A variety of different workshops are offered – everything from Carpentry, Welding, and Plumbing to Electronics, IT Networking, and Culinary Arts – every student will find something to fit their interests. The workshops are hands-on offering students the opportunity to try out different careers. Students may build and test an electrical relay control system in the morning, construct a bird house just before lunch and make tasty artisan bread in the afternoon.

Our youth projects are completely free for schools to attend, with transportation and substitute teacher costs being reimbursed and lunch provided by SCNS. Youth projects being offered during the 2011/2012 school year include the Skills Energy Youth Quest, the African Nova Scotian Youth Conference, the Young Women's Conference, and a variety of TechShop events.

Youth projects take place at NSCC campuses across the province from November to March. This year we are also very excited to work with the Canadian Forces Naval Engineering School to offer students the opportunity to visit the Canadian Forces Base Stadacona in Halifax, NS and learn about careers in skilled trades and technologies in the Royal Canadian Navy. The summer of 2011 saw 155 students from across Nova Scotia earn high school co-op credits. All eight school boards had students involved. Summer co-op provides students with a concentrated co-op placement exploring a variety of careers. Summer co-op numbers have increased each year, and the dedication of teachers who provide these wonderful learning opportunities for their students is recognized by employers and community members.



Employers across Nova Scotia continue to support the tremendous growth in co-op and recognize the importance of providing career exploration opportunities. This summer the Department of Education supported school boards with summer co-op delivery. This support has been the impetus for continued growth.



Building Futures for 5 Years

The Building Futures for Youth Program is entering its 5th year of providing grade 10 and 11 Co-operative Education students the opportunity to explore careers in the construction trades. Developed in partnership with The Construction Association of Nova Scotia (CANS), NS Department of Education – English Program Services, NS Department of Labour and Advanced Education – Apprenticeship Division, and the Nova Scotia Community College, the program has allowed 247 students from across the province the ability to gain experience in a trade, earn co-operative education credits, register as construction trades pre-apprentices, make connections with industry, become eligible for NSCC scholarships and most importantly, gather information to make informed choices about their future.

In 2012, the program will once again be offered to students in all 8 regional school boards. Program components include a 25-hour in-school component, 80 hours workplace orientation, safety, and hands on tools training at an NSCC campus, and finally a 7-week paid summer work placement with a host employer in the construction industry.

EBSCO is a periodical database of hundreds of magazines, newspapers and images accessible via the Internet. It also includes an encyclopedia and a dictionary.



It is a valuable research tool that allows students to access information about current events, historical data, animals, etc., and provides numerous resources for school projects and all their research needs. EBSCO also offers access to a wide variety of professional databases like ERIC and to highly specialized collections of over 450 full text journals, designed for teachers and professional educators. LRTS pays a subscription to this service for all students, parents, teachers, public schools, and school boards in Nova Scotia. It is available through all Ednet connected computers, at home with user names and passwords that can be obtained from your school.

Employee Technology Purchase Option

LRTS has again this year set up an Employee Purchase Option for Lenovo desktops and Toshiba laptops, and is currently also re-acquiring a netbook option, from our successful standing offer vendors.

The program permits one employee purchase per year (desktop, laptop or netbook) of an identical unit as placed in schools. No substitution of components is permitted. Teachers arrange directly with the vendor, then pay by credit card. There is no Board support other than providing the initial contact and information.

Board technicians are not available for support, purchases are personal assets once bought. Warranty and follow-up is done with the vendor/manufacturer directly.

Technology Education

Technology Education summer institutes were a great success during EduFest at NSCC Waterfront campus. Teachers participated in hands-on learning activities in digital photography and solid modelling software, SolidWorks. Be sure to save the dates next year and be first in line to take part in EduFest week—the third week of August.

A new outcomes framework is in place for Technology Education 7–9. Schools offering Technology Education may choose between the old courses and the new courses in Power School. The new course codes are TEC7Y11, TEC8Y11, and TEC9Y11.

Technology Education 9 will be ready for implementation in spring 2012. Schools will be invited to send one participant to a provincial implementation workshop highlighting the four modules of the course: *Inventions and Innovations, Communications Technology, Energy Engineering*, and *Production Technology*. In



addition to a curriculum review, teachers will participate in hands-on minds-on learning activities that can be transferred directly back to the classroom, integrating other subjects through problem-based and project-based learning. We will be working with our partners in industry and NSCC throughout the process and during implementation. Resource distribution will be part of the workshop.

The Province of Nova Scotia is committed to establishing a culture of safety in Technology Production labs as dust collection system repairs and replacements are taking place in schools throughout the province. Schools have been identified in one of three phases based on hours of use. Construction has begun in several schools. Phase one and phase two schools are expected to be completed within the 2011–2012 school year. Phase three schools are expected to be completed by September 2012. Upon completion, all production labs will be safer places to work and learn, with 95% source capture on all sawdust producing machines within the labs.

Understanding Media Literacy: Inside Plato's Cave

Finally, an online credit course for teachers, teachers in training, and students interested in communications studies and media education. Media literacy is a mandated part of the curriculum across Canada, yet there is very little training available at any level. In the past teachers looking for professional development found little or no support. Many avoided teaching media studies because of their lack of education. This new online course will meet that need.

Understanding Media Literacy: Inside Plato's Cave is an online, 13 unit, three credit course written, tested and endorsed by teachers and delivered in partnership with Athabasca University.

Available as a summer workshop, or for individual study, the course is especially designed to aid grades 7 - 12 teachers in helping their students to develop an informed and critical understanding of the nature, impact and techniques of the mass media. The units are highly interactive and will assist teachers in developing skills to adapt these lessons to their students' needs and their teaching situations.



Reading Assessment Resource Primary-3



School boards have undertaken a variety of initiatives this year to support elementary, junior and senior high schools including ongoing training with the STAR program(Strategies for Teaching based on Autism Research), TEACCH based support, functional and social skill programming across all levels and using technology such as the IPod/ IPad. Boards are encouraged to collaborate where possible. These professional development opportunities have allowed schools to keep in the forefront of educational support for students with ASD.

The Early Identification and Intervention Services (EIIS) grant is distributed to boards to support transition for children with autism spectrum disorder from their preschool setting into grade primary. This grant supports the work of professional staff in program planning for these students through transition planning with home and community settings as well as professional development, and resources.

CLASS II school report - Coming This Fall

CLASS is a provincewide research project that looks at the relationships between health, nutrition, physical activity, mental health and school performance of children in Nova Scotia. Last year,

over 5500 Grade 5 students and their parents took part across 272 schools in Nova Scotia. The research team would like to thank all school staff, students and their parents for supporting this research.

This year, each participating school will receive a confidential report with school-specific results from CLASS II. Results will be compared to the provincial averages in the areas of School Performance and Student Achievement relating to healthy eating, physical activity and mental health. This data may help to inform improvements in health promotion in your school and help to support your school improvement and/ or accreditation plan. Professional Learning Opportunities 2011-2012

The NSELC presently offers the following three-day and four-day professional learning modules.

Module 1 "Working with People" includes an opportunity for participants to examine their leadership preferences (Insights Discovery). With this self understanding as a reference, participants explore a wide variety of topics related to working with others in a learning community.

Module 2 "Strategies for Teaching and Learning" is designed to extend participants understanding of the Nova Scotia curriculum (including current initiatives), differentiated instruction, classroom based assessment and evaluation, learning styles and various models of staff development.

Module 4 "The School Leader and the Law" provides participants with the opportunity to explore, comprehend and apply legal principles to a variety of school related issues.

Module 8 "Schooling and Social Justice" provides opportunities to explore racism, sexism, hetrosexism, ableism and classism so participants can develop strategies to create classrooms, and schools dedicated to social justice.

Module 9 "Programming for Students with Special Needs" provides a professional learning experience intended to support educators in developing, implementing and evaluating programming for students with special needs. The term special needs also includes those students who may be gifted and talented.

Module 11 "Leadership in Human Resources" explores labour relation rolls, collective agreements, staff assignments, fair hiring practices, performance appraisals, dispute management, termination, and employee records.

Module 12 "Coaching and Mentoring" helps participants gain a deeper understanding about the dynamics of successful mentoring and coaching relationships, and recognize how these relationships provide critical support for people engaged in the change process.

Module 13 "Using Assessment to Improve Teaching and Learning" focuses on a balanced assessment program and the practical applications for classrooms. Emphasis is on improving learning and instruction through formative assessment practices.

Module 14 "Autism Spectrum Disorder" focuses on the history, diagnostic criteria and associated characteristics of Autism. Participants will learn how to develop comprehensive program plans, how to recognize the roles and responsibilities of the various team members, and the role that assessment plays in effective programming.

NSELC also offers a one-day "Insights Discovery" workshop and a two-day workshop on "Classroom Management".

Cyberbullying Task Force and Working Group

The Cyberbullying Task Force and Working Group have been meeting for two days each month to explore the scope and prevalence of the problem and to hear from researchers and experts on what can be done to help address the issue of bullying and cyberbullying. They met for the first time on June 9 and 10, and again on July 14 and 15, August 17 and 18 and September 12 and 13. A portion of the September meeting was open to the public, as will be the meeting on October 21, 2011. This meeting will be held at Citadel High School Auditorium in Halifax.

Leading Canadian researchers on bullying and cyberbullying, Dr. Wendy Craig and Dr. Shaheen Shariff, have joined the meetings via videoconferencing to give presentations and offer suggestions and possible recommendations. We have also had others generously come to Nova Scotia from across Canada and the United States to present to the Task Force and Working Group, such as Parry Aftab, a leader on cyberbullying issues in the United States and founder of WiredSafety; and Eric Roher, author of Educator's Guide to Violence in Schools. Some of our province's own renowned educators and writers presented to the committee as well. Bob Konopasky, co-author of the paper Education's Perfect Storm: Outmoded or No Bullying Policies, Grievous Harm to Victims and Justifiable Civil Litigations; Barbara Kaiser, author of Challenging Behaviour in Young Children; and Dr. Stan Kutcher, Sun Life Financial Chair of Adolescent Mental Health, shared their perspective and insight on the problem and impact of bullying and cyberbullying. One of the most memorable speakers was Pam Murchinson who lost her daughter Jenna tragically this past year.

The Task Force and Working Group heard from other presenters, such as The Youth Project, YWCA and Misty Morrison, all of whom ran focus groups with some of our marginalized youth, in the LGBT, young female and African Nova Scotian communities. Pam Reardon from Nova Scotia Legal Aid talked about the impact this issue has on youth, in particular those involved or at risk of being involved in the youth criminal justice system. Gerard Cormier from the Nova Scotia Teachers Union presented on the issue of homophobia and the importance of having language in policies that speaks specifically to homophobia and transphobia. Youth focus groups were also conducted with Aboriginal youth, youth with disabilities and mental illness and new immigrant youth, to gain their perspective on this growing problem. Additional focus groups will be happening, through schools, across the province over the next month.

The Task Force is aligned with many community partners to help address this important issue. The Nova Scotia Advisory Council on the Status of Women presented on the hyper-sexualization of women in the media and on the internet; the Nova Scotia Office of the Ombudsman provided information about their youth services division; and the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission discussed how bullying and cyberbullying relates to the Nova Scotia Human Rights Act. Bell Aliant, one of our local internet service providers and the Halifax Regional Police, Community Relations and Crime Prevention division also spoke to us about the important role they can play combating this problem and supporting our children and youth.

Members of the Task Force, chaired by Professor Wayne MacKay, and the Working Group have presented on this issue and shared valuable information on behalf of the organizations they represent. They are scheduled to meet again on October 20 and 21 and November 8 and 9, 2011. Professor MacKay will deliver a report, including recommendations, to the Minister of Education in the coming months.

Teachers attend Global Reach-Global Teach Conference

Shanghai, PRC – Teachers from schools all over China offering the Canadian Nova Scotia Public School Program gathered in Shanghai in late August to participate in a professional learning conference in preparation for the new school year.

The theme of this year's conference was "Global Reach-Global Teach." Teachers and administrators from both private and public schools participated in a selection of workshops tailored to Nova Scotia curriculum and assessment practices, as well as instructional strategies for English as Additional Language (EAL) learners.

The moodle is intended at strengthening collaboration and provides a forum in which teaching professionals working in the 17 schools throughout China offering the Nova Scotia Program can share ideas, practices and resources.

"The idea behind the conference was to build a support network," says Gaye Rawding, the conference organizer and Director of International Programs with the Nova Scotia Department of Education. "If a teacher or principal has a question regarding curriculum, assessment or a particular learning issue in their classroom they can now use the moodle to collaborate. They can now readily contact other experienced educators working in the international schools network." The Nova Scotia Leadership Academy - Instructional Leadership Program

The Instructional Academy Program is being offered by the Nova Scotia Department of Education in partnership with the Nova Scotia Educational Leadership Consortium. The goal of the Academy's program is to improve the capacity for school-based instructional leadership, aimed at increasing student learning and achievement in Nova Scotia public schools.

The Instructional Leadership program extends over three years and leads to a Diploma in Instructional Leadership, granted by the Department of Education. It signifies that holders of the Diploma in Instructional Leadership have achieved and demonstrated competency in instructional leadership. Under the Education Act Regulations, the Instructional Leadership Program is a means for a teacher to upgrade his/her teacher certificate level.

The first cohort in the ILA program began classes in September in two locations in Nova Scotia: Mulgrave and Windsor. Thirty-three principals are enrolled in Year 1 of the program, coming from all eight of the province's school boards. One of the strengths of the program is that each course is co-facilitated by a curriculum specialist and a principal. In this way, theory and practice blend together seamlessly and the curriculum is linked continuously to practice in schools. Instructors in the Academy program for Course I and Course II (Best Practices in Instruction and Assessment) are Brenda MacIsaac and Sue LeBel, and principal facilitators/co-instructors are Lily DeYoung and Terry Wadden. The program consists of six courses, including a unique coaching laboratory course, weekly practicum experiences, and networking and "critical friends" experiences.

Online applications for Cohort II, scheduled to begin in September 2012, will be accepted through the NSILA website beginning in December. The Academy encourages all interested principals and vice-principals to apply. IB Program

Nova Scotia's IB graduates achieved outstanding results in the 2011 IB examinations. Leading the way was Saba Balvardi who achieved an outstanding 44 out of 45 points, an achievement matched by only one IB

student in the history of IB in the province. Saba's achievement is all the more remarkable because she took an additional IB course, the very challenging "Further Mathematics" on a self–study basis, achieving a top score of 7. No other Nova Scotia IB student has ever attempted the Further Mathematics course. After receiving multiple scholarship offers Saba decided to attend McGill University in Montreal.

"IB taught me how to manage my time, keep up with a full course load, how to critique and analyze work, and most importantly it taught me about life outside of the classroom. I was able to spend time with people who shared the same passion as me and I was able to make life long friendships," said Ms. Balvardi.

Saba's family immigrated from Iran in 2007, and she entered Halifax West in grade 10 speaking little English. She credits the teachers at Halifax West and in particular guidance counsellor Ms. Deborah Noonan with helping her through that very difficult first year. Saba's younger sister, Sahar, is also enrolled in the IB diploma program and is in grade 11.

Science: Doing, Thinking, and Connecting

English Program Services was pleased to extend an invitation to school boards earlier this year to partner in the delivery of a one-day professional learning science session on doing and thinking from Primary–6. One representative from each elementary school was invited to this exciting session and asked to share information and resources with others in their schools.

Participants explored science concepts with connections to literacy, mathematics, visual arts, movement, and social studies. Participants were involved in doing and thinking through multidisciplinary hands-on, minds-on activities. One example that the teachers were engaged was the developmental progress in measuring as it relates to science.

The factors that support a positive student/teacher relationship and the role the environment plays in building confidence and competence among learners were addressed. Assessment and technology were embedded in the program throughout the day.

Science 10

Science 10 is a hands-on, minds-on course that for all students. With direct hands-on activities involving doing and thinking, Science 10 is student-centred and inquiry-based-focusing on skills. Canadian Space Agency

In the fall of 2012, Canadian Astronaut Chris Hadfield will blast off to space as he travels aboard a Soyuz

spacecraft to reach the International Space Station (ISS). During his six month mission he will become Canada's first commander of the ISS – a milestone for Canadian space exploration.

To coincide with this historic mission, the Canadian Space Agency (CSA) will offer classrooms unique 3D and immersive learning products. Designed on a gaming platform, students will join Commander Hadfield on a problem solving adventure to the ISS. With Hadfield's avatar as their learning guide, students will explore scientific concepts by acting on their virtual environment and even becoming part of it.

The first of two products will see elementary level students create a living wall inside the space station. Their challenge is to determine how plants can be used to support life in space. Having the ability to shrink down to the size of carbon dioxide molecules, students will actually experience the process of photosynthesis from a perspective to which they would otherwise never have access.





Chris Hadfield spoke to over 800 students at J. L. Ilsley High School on September 28, 2011.

The second, targeted to high school students, will focus on how to plan, launch and keep a space craft in its desired orbit. Hadfield will guide the student's avatar through their challenge to design an attitude control system for an unmanned space craft built to bring supplies to the space station. To further their understanding, the avatars will miniaturize to become elements in the fuel stream travelling through the Soyuz's combustion system and experience the powerful energy transformation that propels the vehicle forward, all the while learning how the system works.

Both products target science curriculum requirements in every province and territory and take an open ended approach to problem solving so your students are in complete control of their learning as well as their progression through the missions.

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Common Curriculum Framework for K-9 Mathematics

Nova Scotia will become the eleventh of thirteen Canadian jurisdictions to adopt the Western and Northern Canadian Protocol (WNCP) Common Curriculum Framework for K–9 Mathematics, May 2006 as the basis of their mathematics curriculum, grades primary–12.

In the past to support curriculum implementation, the Department of Education has created curriculum documents, teachers' guides, support guides, and mental math documents. It has been challenging for teachers to juggle these resources, along with text books and supplemental resources provided over the years.

Boards have been requesting comprehensive resources be packaged together to support implementation of new curriculum. They also wish to optimize support for teachers' professional growth within their school communities. In response to these requests, English Program Services is creating an Implementation Website that would contain all the information teachers will need to successfully implement the new mathematics curriculum being adopted from the Western and Northern Canadian Protocol (WNCP).

This website will allow the curriculum to be searchable, laying out the progression of learning outcome either vertically by grade or horizontally over several grades by strand or key topic. It will also layout a yearly plan and collate all of the materials and good lessons already available to teachers in one central location. It will build in differentiated instructional practices as well as formative assessment practices. The website will also embed professional learning resources for access and use on an as-needed-where-needed basis.

Implementation of the new curriculum will begin in September 2012.
